Association says goodbye to three board members

Past SAA President **Wes Strahm '53**, died June 18, 2019, at the age of 83. His wife, **Sharon Gwynn Strahm '54**, was also 83 when she died on January 24, 2020. Wes served the board in many capacities including vice president, chairman, advisor, and scholarship committee member, starting in 2007. Sharon joined the scholarship committee in 2008 and soon became the committee chair. She was adamant about interviewing scholarship applicants in person to get the best information about the students, a practice still in place today. They both retired from the board in 2015.

Arland "Ace" Johnson '54, died February 28, 2020. He was part of a set of triplets with his two sisters, born in 1935. Ace was voted onto the SAA board in 2009 to help the scholarship committee with fundraising. He made annual donations to the raffle and spent time contacting local merchants to give them a chance to donate items. In 2011 he became raffle committee chair, which resulted in an increase in the raffle income during his tenure. Ace retired from the board in 2019.

The Siuslaw family warmly remembers our late board members and appreciates their enthusiasm, contributions, and dedication to the SAA mission of providing scholarships to SHS graduates.

Jensen: from the West Coast to the White House

This will be an election year like no other. **Joel Jensen '79**, has a perspective like no other on the "regular people" in Washington D.C. and how he came to work with them. Here is his story.

I was born and raised just south of Florence and went to Siuslaw School District 97-J.

I was privileged to have a great small-town background that gave me a wonderful foundation for what God had already planned for me. Those small-town values have served me well throughout my varied and challenging career as a government worker, first with the National Park Service (NPS), and the Office of Administration, Executive Office of the President at the Executive Residence.

Before we get there, I need to let you know how being from SHS helped me to get to that point. A good Christian background was essential in that it led to me having a very boring background for the FBI to investigate every five years but made my clearances a cinch! (Over the years I heard that from every agent...I am boring!) Just as important was having friends from my childhood who I am still very good friends with today...keeping me grounded. I have always felt that since our school was not big, you knew everyone and so there were not all those cliques that my kids had going to a high school with 2,250 of their closest friends.

Going to Oregon State University was vital to me getting my NPS job. I received a degree in Resource Recreation Management but in order to graduate I needed at least one summer of work in my field of study, which led me to applying for

the NPS job. Which led to my mandatory graduation internship the next summer with the NPS. Besides getting my degree at OSU, I needed a lot of growing up to do in a controlled environment; that for me in-

cluded working my entire time at college.

When you apply for the summer NPS job you can choose *only* two locations and so I naturally chose Crater Lake and President's Park (since I *love* studying presidents). Of course, you know what job I got...

Off to the east coast I went in May of 1982, again in the summer of '83, and permanently in April of '84 (after graduating in '83). While at the NPS I helped get the tours into: The White House, Spring and Fall Garden Tour, Easter Egg Roll, 4th of July, Topping of the National Christmas Tree with Barbara Bush in '84 and '85, National Christmas Tree Pageant Lighting, White House Christmas Candle Light Tours, LaFayette Park, and working occasionally at the Washington Monument, Lincoln Memorial, and the Old Post Office Bell Tower.

As with all jobs there comes a time to move on and so on August

31, 1986, I started working in the Executive Residence doing purchasing of all products coming into The White House and did that job during the administrations of Reagan, Bush, Clinton, Bush, Obama, and finally, Trump.

Inauguration Day means all hands on deck! In the short amount of time between the outgoing president leaving The White House in the morning and the incoming walking in, everything is changed. Literally everything gets changed to make the new family feel at home. They box up all the outgoing family's personal belongings and ship them out. Then switch out the furniture (in the private quarters only), pictures, food, flowers, even the drapes, and unpack the new family's belongings, all in a matter of a few hours!

After almost 35 year of government service, I retired on September 30, 2018.

Everybody always wants to know about the job "inside" The White House. My interactions with all the first families were *non-political*. When they came home to the Residence, they were home and just regular people as you and me. I have many fond memories of all the joys and sorrows that come to any family during everyday living... even first families.

One funny story that comes to my mind was when I worked for the NPS and we got a mid-summer evaluation. I was marked down because I was too friendly! When I asked why I was told that, "Nobody is naturally as friendly as you are." My reply was, "Everyone from Oregon sure is!"

Running through the Siuslaw Dunes

Trail running has exploded in popularity over the past decade. It bears little resemblance to most people's high school cross country experience.

Jeremy Long '96, created Daybreak Racing in 2016 and it has steadily grown to offer five events throughout the year and he now calls race director his full-time job. His goal is about getting people outdoors to experience trail running in the Pacific Northwest in a fun. safe. and meaningful way. They strive to produce events that aren't 'just another race' and to offer relevant and unique courses that feel natural and unforced, staged at cool venues where everyone's finish is rewarded with hugs and high fives from your race director (when social distancing allows!), handcrafted awards, and cheers from friends and family. Daybreak emphasizes stewardship opportunities throughout the year too, by working to protect outdoor spaces for recreational use and maintaining and restoring trails in need. Jeremy's younger brothers **Aaron Long '97**, and **Will Krett** '**09**, support the races behind the scenes as volunteers.

Jeremy has always appreciated the beauty and rugged wildness of the Oregon Coast. Born in Florence, he grew up running cross country and track and spent lots of time outdoors in the forests, lakes, beaches, and dunes. Because it is such a unique and beautiful area with lots of interconnecting trails, the idea of hosting a race there has always been on his short list of possibilities. Staging it at the lodge at Cleawox in Honeyman State Park was a nobrainer and just a perfect venue. It took him several years to stitch together the courses on the map, scouting out every inch in person. He talked to local friends and stakeholders, especially longtime friend Chris Johnson, the SHS athletic director and cross country and track & field head coach. Despite Chris' reservations of how difficult the race courses would be, he was excited and supportive of the concept from the beginning. Plus having the SHS



running teams as the non-profit beneficiary of the event made it a perfect fit. After proposing the Siuslaw Dunes event concept to the US Forest Service and Honeyman and getting their support, it was all set. He also decided it would be fun to have the event be dog friendly, lending a nod to the old Oregon Dune Musher's Mail Run (sled dog race) that used to take place across the dunes. This definitely added another layer of fun to the event. The Siuslaw Dunes trail run was to be the last run of the season as the COVID-19 pandemic spread across the globe.
