Zimmerman recalls Florence life in the 1940s

Florence was quiet in 1939. The timber industry was waning and the mill had shut down. There was not enough fishing to support the town and the rest of the world had not discovered the beauty of the Oregon Coast. Tourism had not gotten a foothold yet. Highway 101 was relatively new; it had opened in March of 1936.

There was a CCC camp at the south end of Woahink Lake. The Civilian Conservation Corp. was introduced by Franklin Roosevelt along with the WPA. It provided work for jobless young men. Those in our area were from inner cities on the east coast. Some had never before seen a tree or a lake. They left a few nice legacies for us, such as the bathhouse at Cleawox and some of the picnic kitchens at Woahink.

Life during wartime

When World War II hit (December 7, 1941) the CCC camp became an army camp. Arming and patrolling the Oregon Coast was top priority. There were three Coast Guard bases. One camp patrolled the beach and Siltcoos Outlet with guard dogs. The boys doing that were housed at the former Houghtalings's Resort on the west side of Woahink. There was, of course, the life boat station at the north of the Siuslaw River. The army camp at Woahink guarded the Siuslaw River Bridge. The third base was at the Heceta Head Lighthouse; their job was to guard the tunnel. We also occasionally saw blimps fly over from the base at Tillamook. Several of the servicemen married local girls and stayed in Florence.

Our classes got quite small as the boys reached military age. That was

18, but it did seem to affect the senior class each year. The 1943 class had 24 graduates.

The old high school

There were four teachers in the high school. One of them was also



principal; T.S. Thompson was there for several years. He seemed so rigid and scary. We all listened for him to walk down the hall: he had distinguishing footsteps. It must have been hard for him to maintain that demeanor; he was only 23. He married a fellow teacher, Margaret Weiss, and they stayed in the area for quite a while.

Our school was on the site of the current events center. When I started my freshman year the school was a U-shape. It had, if I remember correctly, four regular classrooms, a typing room, a library, and the principal's office. A year or so later a gym was added between the wings. Complete with a stage, basketball court, and dance floor (not that anyone knew how to dance). When I was asked if the school had a basement, I knew there was because when we had the school play the girls missed their cue because they were in the basement. As the hijinks go...the boys were known to smoke on the sand road that was south of the school and then were made to sit

in the principal's office. The previous principal had the pleasure of having the McCormick twins put a mink in his desk drawer for a surprise!

There were no dances but the school had a football and basketball team. We played Waldport, Siletz, and Reedsport. We skated on the second floor of Kyle's store and we played duck bowling (played with small balls) in Bill Karnowsky's building.

I was editor of the school paper, the Sand Doin's, one year. It was typed on stencils and printed on a mimeograph machine.

I think there were two buses. A yellow standard size from the Cushman area and a very small one from the North Fork, driven by Mr. Francisco. There were not many cars; gas was scarce. Cathy Bossford drove a little yellow pickup and Phyllis Martin drove herself, her siblings, and the Merze's in from Canary in her blue Ford.

Making friends

I was considered to have moved from "the outside" in 1937 when I was 12 years old. It did not take long to make friends, however. On my 16th birthday in 1941 Elsie Johnston took a group of us to the lighthouse. Mary Lou Johnson's father was the lighthouse keeper. When we returned my mother had prepared a special dinner for all of us. The whole group included Cleo Chandler, Faye Rice, Berniece Murray, Joyce Johnston, and Juanita Torgerson.


SHS Hall of Fame

The Intruders rock 'n roll into Siuslaw history

If you remember dancing to "Louie Louie" and "Wipe Out" in the high school gym, you were probably rockin' to The Intruders. They played songs from Paul Revere & The Raiders, The Wailers, and The Ventures.

The Intruders were formed 57 years ago in 1962 at the Weaver house on Rhododendron Drive. The original group consisted of Tom Trammel, rhythm guitar, Denny Weaver, lead guitar, and Mike Phillips, drums. Rick Schneider played drums for a short time before Mike joined. The band didn't have a bass player so in 1963 Willy Phillips, Mike's brother, started learning bass and playing with the band.

The band played local school dances and put on their own dances, renting various halls around Florence. The band added Gib Randall in 1965 to play electric organ for a bigger sound. In 1966 Tom needed to leave the band and go to work to support his new family with Debby Dunn Trammel so Gary Henry from

Mapleton was added to the band. Gary had a band in Mapleton called The Avengers.

All members have continued to play music since the Intruder days.

Denny joined the popular Northwest band The Wailers in 1967 and when they broke up he played with some of the guys in Sweet Roll. Denny played with various people in Nashville and Daytona Beach. Denny now does a show in Florence at the Homegrown Pub providing the guests with soft background music to dine by.

Tom played bass with a country band before forming a gospel group with wife Debby. They still play gospel music together in a very successful group called The Trammels.

Willy played with various artists around Eugene and did a lot of road work in Alaska, Canada, and the Midwest before settling down at The Embers in Eugene for 20 years with Billy McCoy. Willy passed away in February 2013.

Gary has played around the area over the years in Coos Bay and Flo-



rence with the band KUSH and is currently playing in the Lebanon area with Amos True and the Easy Target at various wineries.

Mike left for LA in 1968 with a Eugene group called The Small Crowd. They played the Troubadour and with the help of Bill McEuen, manager of the Dirt Band, got signed with Liberty Records. The group broke up before the album was finished unfortunately, but Mike worked clubs in LA and Denver and did some studio work before returning to Eugene in 1981 to work lodges and the Embers. He also plays music with KUSH.

Ramona (Mona) Meink Slocum, Class of 1949, contributed greatly to the creation of the Siuslaw Alumni




Association. On September 9, 2000, a vote was taken at a class reunion meeting to begin the SAA.
