An open love letter to Siuslaw High School

In the summer of 1985, I distinctly remember looking up from the sports section of The Register-Guard to hear my dad say, "We just bought a house; this is where we're going to live when I retire next year." I was in our friend's house near Heceta Beach and was stunned into silence. I had no idea that moving to Florence was even an option. I certainly did not know how to pronounce Siltcoos Lake, which was where the house was located, and I felt real apprehension about coming in new to attend high school. I feel blessed to have attended Siuslaw High School and to be part of such a wonderful community even if it did not feel that way at that moment...

My brother, **David '91**, and I had been adopted as infants by Tom and Lydia Brackney in Saigon, Vietnam, in the early 70s. In service of my dad's career, we settled in Bangladesh for my K-9 years at the American International School of Dhaka. This impending transition from a small international school in the Indian subcontinent to the hallowed halls of SHS would indeed be significant!

The three years I spent at SHS impacted the trajectory of my life and shaped many of the values I hold dear today. In life there are tributaries and rivers that help sand out the edges of one's character and persona. SHS provided both for me.

I spent a lot of time involved in athletics—football, basketball, and ran track. Sports provided an entrée for me into a high school society that had largely grown up together. In fact, completing the crucible that is summer JV football two-a-days tends to bind a cohort together, and

in the summer of 1986, I felt as if I had survived initiation. Sports helped me find my tribe. Affinito, Little, Weston, Galbraith, Giddens, Gray, Becker, Nivens, Varner, Daniels, and numerous other

coaches taught me about sport and life and helped with that treacherous transition from high school to real life

Head Football Coach Len Lutero impacted so many lives, including mine. I learned about leadership and invoke many of his lessons even today. Coach Lutero was an incredible coach but his real gift was insatiable curiosity and a desire for discourse. Many of our best conversations had nothing to do with football and were rooted in the world-at-large.

Ironically, it was another Lutero who jolted me to take the road less traveled. Sitting with Mrs. Lutero in a counseling session about college, she dared me – in fact, she challenged me – to dream big. I decided to apply to the University of Notre Dame and then lo and behold, I got in! Going away to school opened so many opportunities to learn and connect with people and gave me a college experience that is very foundational to who I am today.

SHS faculty have their fingerprints all over the underpinnings of my career and life. At Notre Dame, I majored in accounting and when I got my first job at Price Waterhouse, in my head I could hear Mr. Vavich loudly telling us in an accounting class that the job market for CPAs was "red hot". When I applied to graduate schools, I leaned on lessons taught by Mr. Danielson and Mrs. May, who preached connection with the audience. I got my MBA from Stanford and at graduation I remembered early mornings in the computer lab with Mr. Wilcox as he was introducing me to the concept of computer programming and using a PC to solve problems.

When I look through the kaleidoscope of my life, I see the many shapes and colors that have formed my being. These experiences have given me perspective and context, they ground me in a world that is hyper-connected and desires to move faster by the second. I'm filled with optimism and gratitude because my parents gave me a chance to live a life filled with love, joy, and discovery. I'm able to understand the difficulties that many in other countries traverse, as I saw abject poverty and despair firsthand in a decade of life in the Third World. The blue and gold of SHS push me to be competitive and to dream big but root me in a desire to be make positive connections with people and solve problems.

Thank you, Siuslaw, for all you have done for me, I will always be grateful. Hail, Siuslaw, hail.
